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

RICE:

Retail prices of all the local rice varieties have decreased. Accordingly, prices of local nadu grade I, raw red and raw white have decreased by Rs.3.00/kg and respective average prices were Rs.100.00/kg, Rs.81.00/kg and Rs.84.00/ kg. A considerable price increase was noted for *ponni* samba.

VEGETABLES:

Increasing trend in supplies in the early phase of *Yala* harvesting season caused price drops in both upcountry and lowcountry varieties by a considerable margin, compared to last month. Of the upcountry varieties, the highest price decrease was reported for leeks as 47% whereas the highest price drop in domestic vegetables was reported for brinjal as 37% in the wholesale market.





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EXPLANTATORY NOTE

The Food Information Bulletin is a monthly publication containing information relating to producer, wholesale and retail prices of selected food commodities in selected markets in and around Colombo and main markets in the major producing areas. Data on extent, production and imports are also available in the bulletin.

The information is analyzed and presented as, prevailing prices, price ranges, averages and comparison of monthly prices. The changes in prices reported are always in relation to price, which prevailed during the previous month unless otherwise stated.

1. Paddy

Crop Situation

The prospects of paddy crop in 2018 *Yala* season were satisfactory in most of the major producing areas and the crop is at late vegetative to harvesting stages. Dry weather prevailed in most of the major producing areas in the country throughout the month. A satisfactory progress was recorded in producing areas in Mahaweli Zones, Eastern Province, Polonnaruwa and Hambantota Districts. According to the latest crop forecast report of the Department of Agriculture, the target paddy extent is 422,978 ha. The cultivation progress up to end June is 378,826 ha and it is 90% of the target. The cultivation progress is approximately same compared to the average extent of last three *Yala* seasons. Further, reports reveal that the production forecast for the *Yala* season is 1.49 million Mt. Crop damages were reported in Kurunegala, Ampara and Polonnaruwa districts mainly due to the pest damages like brown plant hopper. Harvesting of paddy crop progressed in producing areas in the Eastern province and Moneragala district by latter part of the month.

Producer Prices

Prices of long grain white paddy have declined in all major producing areas mainly due to the arrival of new harvest from the producing areas in the Eastern province. However, the low prices were further recorded for long grain red paddy in the producing areas in the Southern Province due to the satisfactory harvest in the last *Maha* season. However, the prices of short grain paddy have increased slightly in most of the major producing areas throughout the month due to the limited supplies of paddy to the markets as a result of crop failure in last *Maha* season. A slight decline was recorded in Kalawewa major short grain producing area. The monthly average prices of long grain white paddy have decreased by 3% -8% in all considered major producing areas and the highest decrease was recorded from Kurunegala. Prices of short grain and long grain white were ranged between Rs.46.00-60.00/kg and Rs.32.00-46.00/kg in major producing areas in the Southern province and prices ranged between Rs.30.00-35.00/kg. According to the field information it is expected that paddy prices will decrease during next month due to the progress of *Yala* season harvesting.

Compared to the same period of last year, the prices of short grain white paddy have increased by 4%-17%. However, the prices of long grain white and long grain red paddy have decreased by 12%-30% in most of the considered major producing areas with the highest decline being recorded for long grain red in Embilipitiya.

Rice Demand and Supply Situation

Wholesale Prices

Wholesale prices of all the local rice varieties, have further decreased during the month of July as well. Price ranges of samba grade I and grade II were Rs.105.00-110.00/kg and Rs.98.00-104.00/kg respectively. Accordingly, the highest price decrease was noted for local raw white as 5% and the average price was Rs.70.00/kg. Further, prices of raw red, nadu grade II and samba grade II have decreased by 4%, 3% and 2% respectively. The respective average prices were Rs.64.00/kg, Rs.77.00/kg and Rs.101.00/kg. Increased market arrivals of local stocks resulted this price decrease. A total quantity of 525mt. worth of Rs.59mn. of rice had been imported during the month of July. However, compared to previous month, imported quantity for this month has drastically decreased and this was the lowest imported quantity since last January. Hence, price of imported samba has increased by 12% and average price was Rs.67.00/kg. Imported nadu stocks were not available in the market due to limited supply.

Out of the total imports, 341mt. comprised of basmati; 105mt. comprised of *ponni* samba; 71mt. comprised of raw white and 9mt. comprised of nadu. Majority quantities of basmati had been imported from Pakistan and India. A few quantities were also imported from Thailand and Australia. The average CIF price for basmati was Rs.171.00/kg. Raw white had been imported from India (65%) and Pakistan (35%) and the average CIF price was Rs.64.00/kg. Nearly all *ponni* samba quantities were imported from Vietnam and few quantities were imported from China and India. The average CIF price for *ponni* samba was Rs.62.00/kg. Majority of nadu had been imported from India and few quantities were imported from China as well. The average CIF price for nadu was Rs.76.00/kg.

Compared to the same period of last year, wholesale prices of all the local rice varieties except samba varieties have decreased in the range of 3%-5%. However, prices of samba varieties have increased in the range of 8%-10%. Meanwhile, price of imported samba has increased by 20%.

Retail Prices

Retail prices of all the local rice varieties have decreased during the month of July. Accordingly, prices of local nadu grade I, raw red and raw white have decreased by Rs.3.00/kg and respective average prices were Rs.100.00/kg, Rs.81.00/kg and Rs.84.00/kg. Further, prices of both local samba grade II and nadu grade II have decreased by Rs.2.00/kg and respective price ranges were Rs.100.00-110.00/kg and Rs.80.00-100.00/kg. Price of local samba grade I has also decreased by less than Rs.1.00/kg and average price was Rs.119.00/kg. Prices of all imported rice varieties, except samba have decreased during the month. Consequently, price of imported raw white has decreased by Rs.2.00/kg and average price was 84.00/kg. Price of nadu has also decreased by less than Rs.1.00/kg and the price ranged between Rs.80.00-95.00/kg. However, price of *ponni* samba has increased by Rs.9.00/kg and average price was Rs.102.00/kg.

Referring to retail prices of outstation markets except Colombo, the highest samba prices ranged between Rs.115.00-120.00/kg from Matara market, while the lowest price ranged between Rs.95.00-101.00/kg from Hanguranketha market. The highest nadu price ranged between Rs.100.00-105.00/kg from Moneragala and Embilipitiya markets, while the lowest price ranged between Rs.80.00-90.00/kg from Matara market. The highest price of Rs.90.00/kg for raw red was reported from Kandy and Kegalle markets, while the lowest price of Rs.75.00/kg was reported from Embilipitiya and Tissamaharama markets. Furthermore, the highest price of Rs.95.00/kg for raw white was reported from Kegalle market, while the lowest price of Rs.79.00/kg was reported from Ampara market.

Compared to the same period of last year, the retail prices of all the local rice varieties, except samba have decreased in the range of 7%-10%. Prices of samba have increased in the range of 10%-11%. Subsequently, prices of all the imported rice varieties, except nadu have also increased in the range of 5%-15%.

2. Other Field Crops

2.1 Chilli

Crop Situation

About 3,796 ha of green chilli had been cultivated by the end of July 2018, which represent 75% achievement in extent from the targeted extent of 5084 ha. Though the highest targeted extent was reported from Anuradhapura (652 ha) the highest cultivated extent was reported from Moneragala (475 ha) followed by Puttalam (440 ha). Daluwa, Nirmalapura, Alankuda and Norochcholai are major green chilli cultivation areas in Puttalam district. Approximately; 17,780 mt of harvest is expected from the available cultivated extent of green chilli according to the crop forecast by the Department of Agriculture and around 54% of the production will be supplied to the market from Puttalam (21%), Moneragala (18%), Anuradhapura (8%) and Matale (7%) districts. About 25% decrease in the cultivated extent and 40% decrease of production were observed in green chilli cultivation in Sri Lanka against the previous *Yala* season due to unfavourable weather condition that prevailed.

Prices and Supply/Demand Situation

All the major producing areas showed higher producer prices for green chilli through the month of July 2018. In line with the producer prices, both wholesale and retail prices of green chilli have increased by about Rs.185.00/kg and Rs.250.00/kg respectively. Supply of green chilli from main producing areas has decreased due to lower cultivation progress from the target. The average wholesale and retail prices of green chilli were Rs.471.17/kg and Rs.700.22/kg respectively and both prices were higher than that of the prices of dried chilli. Compared to the same period of last year, both wholesale and retail prices of green chilli have increased by about 78% and 58% respectively.

A quantity of 5,292 mt of dried chilli was imported from India during this month and it was an increase of 2,674 mt compared to that of the previous month. The CIF price was Rs.219.40/kg and it was a decrease of Rs.6.78/kg compared to last month. However, both wholesale and retail prices of imported dried chilli have increased by about Rs.5.00/kg and Rs.12.00/kg respectively. Compared to the same period of last year wholesale and retail prices of imported dried chilli have increased by about S0% and 40% respectively.

2.2 Big Onion and Red Onion

Crop situation

In the Matale district about 628 ha big onion had been cultivated representing only 30% of the targeted extent by the end of July 2018. When compared to previous *Yala* season, about 49% decreased in the cultivated extent was observed in the Matale district due to prevailed unfavourable weather condition at the beginning of the season. Cultivation will take place till the mid of August 2018 in the Matale district. Dambulla, Seegiriya, Galewela and Dewahuwa are the major big onion producing areas in Matale district.

It is predicted that the big onion production will be nearly 12,554 mt in Matale district and out of that 69% is expected from Dambulla and Sigiriya areas. About 3% of the production would be harvested in end of August, 34% in September and 63% in October. October will be the peak harvesting season due to cultivation delay at the beginning of the season and there will be a risk that the harvest may be damaged by the rainy weather condition in October. However, expected production of big onion during this season in Matale district has also dropped by about 49% when compared to that of the previous *Yala* season due to decreased cultivated extent.

In Anuradhapura district about 157 ha had been cultivated representing only 14% of the total targeted extent by the end of July 2018. About 47% decrease in the cultivated extent was also observed in the Anuradhapura district against the previous *Yala* season due to bad weather condition.

The cultivated extent of red onion for *Yala* season was 2,245 ha by the end of July representing 55% of the targeted extent in Sri Lanka. The highest cultivated extent was reported from Jaffna (1,134 ha) followed by Puttalam (521 ha).

Paniadei, Thalawila and Palakuda areas in Puttalam district mainly cultivate red onion for selling red onion bulb and Kalpitiya area mainly focus on selling red onion leaves. The production forecast of red onion of this *Yala* season is about 27,546 mt and out of that around 78% was supplied from Jaffna (44%) and Puttalam (34%) districts.

Prices and Supply/Demand Situation

A quantity of 18,938 mt of big onion was imported in July 2018 which was about 1,132 mt lesser compared to previous month. Out of the total imported big onion stocks, 94% was imported from India while 6% from Pakistan. Average CIF price was Rs.49.05/kg and it has increased by about Rs.9.17/kg against the previous month. Hence, both wholesale and retail prices of imported big onion have increased by about Rs.4.00/kg and Rs.6.00/kg respectively. Compared to the same period of last year, both wholesale and retail prices of imported big onion have increased by 20% and 19% respectively. Stocks of local big onion will be supplied to the market at the end of next month in small quantities.

Supplies of both sinnan and vedalan red onion from Jaffna and Puttalam districts have increased during this month with the commencement of harvesting season. Average wholesale price of sinnan was Rs.109.00/kg and Rs.116.85/kg for the vedalan red onion. Average retail prices of sinnan and

vedalan were Rs.184.01/kg and Rs.193.91/kg respectively and retail price of sinnan has decreased by Rs.47.00/kg due to high supplies. Prices of local red onion will decrease further during coming months with the increase of supply from main producing areas.

About 128 mt of red onion were imported from India during this month and it was a decrease of 1,500 mt compared to the previous month. Average CIF price was Rs.67.17/kg and it was a decrease of Rs.31.06/kg compared to that of last month. Though wholesale price of imported red onion has increased by Rs.9.00/kg retail price has decreased by about Rs.22.00/kg. Compared to the same period of last year, wholesale price of imported red onion has decreased by about 48%.

2.3 Potato

Crop Situation and Progress

The targeted extent of potato for *yala* 2018 is 3,062 ha and about 1,782 ha were cultivated in the country by the end of July achieving 58% of the targeted extent. Though the cultivated extent was low in April to June of this *yala* season, the extent of potato cultivated in July was high, which was recorded as 1,129 ha. Compared to the same period of *yala* 2017, the cultivated extent has increased by 24% in *yala* 2018 due to increased cultivation in the Badulla district.

In the Nuwara Eliya district, the targeted extent is 915 ha for this *yala* season and about 510 ha were cultivated by the end of July achieving 56% of the targeted extent. Compared to *yala* 2017, the cultivated extent is at low level in this *yala* season in Nuwara Eliya. Due to prevailed stormy rainy weather condition, the production of potato has dropped by 35% in the district. In the Badulla district, the targeted extent is 2,145 ha for this *yala* season and about 1,272 ha were cultivated by the end of this month achieving 59% of the target. Out of the total cultivated extent by the end of this month about 70% was recorded in July due to favourable weather condition. Compared to the same period of last *yala* season, the cultivated extent was at high level in the district. According to the cultivated extent up to end of this month, the expected production of potato is 29,175 mt for this *yala* season in the country.

Prices and Supply/Demand Situation

A quantity of 17,703 mt of potato had been imported in July which was 10,325 mt higher than that was imported during the previous month. Special Commodity Levy for imported potato remained at Rs.40.00/kg. Majority of the imported stocks were received from Pakistan (52%) and China (47%). CIF price of imported potato from China (Rs.43.50/kg) is higher than the CIF price recorded

for imported potato from Pakistan (Rs.26.00/kg). Compared to July, 2017 (11,009 mt), the imports were high during this month. Average CIF price was Rs.35.00/kg in July

Both local and imported stocks were available in the market. With regard to local potato, the supply of Welimada potato was at a low level due to end of the peak harvesting period. Only stocks supplied from Nuwara Eliya were available in the market. Wholesale and retail prices of Nuwara Eliya potato has increased by 16% and 7% respectively as the harvesting was affected due to heavy rains. On average, the producer price of Nuwara Eliya potato was Rs.141.00/kg in July due to decreased production. Meanwhile, the wholesale and retail prices of imported potato have decreased by 22% and 1% respectively due to increased imports in July. During the month, the wholesale prices of Nuwara Eliya and imported potatoes ranged between Rs.130.00-200.00/kg and Rs.65.00-105.00/kg respectively. Compared to the same period of last year, the current retail prices of Nuwara Eliya (12%) and imported (6%) potatoes have increased. Supply of local potato will be low till the commencement of harvesting season for Welimada potato and the prices of local potatoes are expected to increase further in August.

2.4 Green gram and Cowpea Crop Situation and Progress

According to the latest Crop Forecast issued by the Department of Agriculture in July 2018, 26% of the targeted green gram cultivation extent has been achieved by June 2018. Thus, the green gram cultivation extent has added 2,405 ha by this month. Compared to the green gram cultivation extent in the previous *Yala* season (i.e., 2017 *Yala* season), the current cultivation extent has increased by 49%. It is an increase of 785 ha. The highest cultivation extent of green gram is observed in Monaragala district (827 ha; 57%), followed by Kurunegala (184 ha; 25%) and Hambantota (95 ha; 3%) districts. Considering the crop damages, the expected production from the island-wide green gram cultivation is 3,235 MT. This is 72% of the production during the previous *Yala* season.

The total cultivation extent of cowpea is recorded as 3,102 ha by July, 2018. It is a 36% achievement from the targeted extent cultivation, 8,563 ha, during this *Yala* season. Compared to the cowpea cultivation extent in the previous *Yala* season, the cultivation extent in this season has decreased by 7%. Of the targeted cultivation extent, the highest is targeted in Ampara district, followed by Monaragala district. Meanwhile, the highest cultivation extents are observed in the same districts. Cowpea has been cultivated approximately in 1,224 ha in Ampara and 775 ha in Moneragala districts. These two districts represent 39% and 25% of the total cowpea cultivation extent, respectively. The total cowpea production anticipated during this *Yala* season is 4,465 MT, and it is 128% of the cowpea production in the previous *Yala* season. The highest production is anticipated as 1,844 MT from Ampara district, which may contribute to 40% of the total expected production. The second highest production is expected as 1,252 MT from Monaragala district, followed by 237 MT from Batticaloa district.

Prices and Supply Demand Situation

The wholesale price of green gram ranged between Rs.200.00/kg and Rs.215.00/kg with an average of Rs.212/kg in July, 2018. The average price has reduced by 2% compared to the previous month. Similarly, compared to the same period of last year, the wholesale price has reduced by 3%. In the meantime, retail price of green gram ranged between Rs.220.00/kg and Rs.280.00/kg with an average of Rs.246.00/kg. Compared to the previous month, the retail price has increased by 3%. However, compared to the same period of last year, the retail price of this month has reduced by 3%. However, compared to the same period of last year, the retail price of this month has reduced by 1.4%.

A total of 1,576 MT of green gram has been imported during this month, and it is an increase of 14% compared to the green gram quantity imported in the previous month. The average CIF price of a kilo of green gram was Rs.136.00/kg, which is a decrease of Rs.5/kg compared to the average CIF price noted in the previous month. The total expenditure of the importation of green gram was recorded as Rs.214 million and this value decreases by 4% of the total value spent on green gram importation in the previous month. Of the total imports this month, the highest quantity has been imported from Australia (29%), followed by Argentina (27%), Kenya (17%), Venezuela (8%), Turkey (6%), Uzbekistan (6%), Myanmar (5%), Thailand (2%), China (0.01%) and India.

Average wholesale prices of white and red cowpea were recorded as Rs.202.00/kg and Rs.210.00/kg, respectively in July. The wholesale price range of white cowpea ranged between Rs.200.00/kg and Rs.210.00/kg, and that of red cowpea ranged between Rs.150.00/kg and Rs.265.00/kg. Compared to previous month, wholesale price of white cowpea has decreased by 2% while the price of red cowpea has also increased by 9%. Compared to the same period of last year, wholesale prices of white and red cowpea have decreased by 9% and 22%, respectively. Meanwhile, average retail prices of white and red cowpea were recorded as Rs.283.00/kg and Rs.291.00/kg, respectively. Retail price of white cowpea ranged between Rs.220.00/kg and Rs.340.00/kg, and that of red cowpea also ranged between Rs.230.00/kg and Rs.340.00/kg. Compared to the previous month, price of white cowpea has decreased by 1% and price of red cowpea has increased by 1%. Compared to the same period of last year, retail prices of white cowpea has decreased by 1% and price of red cowpea has increased by 1%.

Of the two types of cowpea, a total of 628 MT of white cowpea have been imported during this month. It is an increase of 71 MT compared to the quantity imported in the previous month. The average CIF price of a kilo of white cowpea was recorded as Rs.131.00/kg, which is a decrease of Rs.2.18/kg from that of the previous month. Importation of cowpea has also decreased. The total expenditure on white cowpea importation has increased by 11% compared to importation of expenditure of the previous month. The total value of the cowpea imports was noted as approximately Rs.82 million. Of the total cowpea imports, the highest quantity of cowpea was imported from Madagascar (45%) and the rest was imported from Myanmar (39%), India (12%) and China (4%).

2.5 Red dhal

Prices and Supply/Demand Situation

Wholesale price of red dhal ranged between Rs.98.00/kg and Rs.107.00/kg with an average of Rs.102.00/kg, and the retail price ranged between Rs.115.00/kg and Rs.140.00/kg with an average of Rs.128.00/kg. Moreover, difference of two prices is Rs.26.00/kg during this month. Compared to the same period of last year, wholesale and retail prices have decreased by 26% and 20%, respectively.

During this month, a total of 9,720 MT of red dhal has been imported at an average CIF price of Rs.78.00/kg. Difference between average CIF prices of this month and the previous month is about Rs. 2.00. Of the total red dhal quantity, the largest quantity (i.e., 7,531MT) was of the whole type while the rest (i.e., 2,189 MT) was of the split type. Of the whole type red dhal, 57% from Australia and 43% from Canada have been imported. The total value of the whole type red dhal imports was Rs. 542 million, with an average CIF price of Rs.72.00 per kilo. Of the split type red dhal, the biggest quantity has been imported from Canada (99%) and followed by India (1%) and U.A.E. (0.1%). The average CIF price of split type was noted as Rs.97.00 per kilo and the total value of the imports of split type was Rs.218.00 million.

3. Vegetables

Crop Situation

Due to flood related early setbacks in *Yala* cultivation, cultivation progress reported a slow progress by the end of July, in most of the districts, except for Hambantota.

Regarding the cultivation progress of the present *Yala* season, the most important districts for upcountry vegetable production, Nuwara Eliya and Badulla had reported 68% and 61% cultivation progress respectively, of its respective seasonal targets, for upcountry varieties by the end of July. Meanwhile, the cultivation progress of upcountry varieties reported in Matale, Kandy and Puttalam districts were comparatively low, reaching the values of 39%, 39% and 24% respectively, by the end of July 2018. On the other hand, cultivation progress for upcountry varieties in Jaffna and Kurunegala district has increased to 59% and 68% by the end of the considered period.

Meanwhile, land preparation and initial crop establishment for *Yala* season commenced in all the lowcountry districts with a comparatively higher cultivation progress than upcountry areas. The highest cultivation progress was reported in Hambantota district, with the reported progress of 119% against its seasonal target. Next, Puttalam and Kurunegala districts had reported 93% and 62% cultivation progress of its respective seasonal targets, for lowcountry vegetables by the end of July. However, low water availability for cultivation, which had continued from the previous season, hampered the cultivation progress of Anuradhapura along with Monaragala, the two most important districts for low country vegetables. The two districts reported only 45% and 69% cultivation progress respectively. Meantime Matale and Jaffna districts had recorded 52%, and 73% cultivation progress respectively, for lowcountry varieties, from its corresponding seasonal targets.

Prices and supply/Demand situation

As the early phase of *Yala* harvesting season approached, supplies had shown an increasing trend at the Dambulla Dedicated Economic Centre by 37.5 %, compared to last month, with a reported daily arrival of 1,150 mt.

Increasing trend in supplies during the initial phase of the *Yala* harvesting season resulted in a decline in vegetable prices by a considerable margin, compared to last month. Among the upcountry vegetables, leeks prices fell by the highest margin of 47% to Rs.115.00 reported last month, from Rs.217.00/kg. Next, price of carrot and radish had decreased by 20% and 13% respectively, from its respective wholesale prices recorded in June. According to the market information, observed price drops were attributed to the continuous high supplies from major upcountry vegetable producing district - Nuwara Eliya. Meantime, prices of other upcountry varieties had dropped by less than 3%, except for beetroot and cabbage. Beetroot and cabbage prices increased compared to

last month by 32% and 30% respectively, due to supply of high quality upcountry variety to the wholesale market.

In the meantime, price of tomato had started to show a slight decrease of 8% with the high supplies from both upcountry (Nuwara Eliya and Badulla) and lowcountry (Sooriyawewa) major producing areas, during the early phase of *Yala* harvesting season. A similar trend was observed relating to capsicum prices whereby a drop of 13% was observed compared to last month due to high supplies.

Supply of all the domestic vegetables had also increased due to high supply during the early phase of the *Yala* harvesting season. As a result, prices of most of the domestic varieties had showed a decreasing trend in comparison to its prices recorded last month, with noticeable price decreases reported for brinjal and luffa. The highest price drop was recorded for brinjal as 37%, followed by luffa and cucumber as 31% and 25% respectively, compared to last month, due to reaching of the harvesting season in major producing areas such as Hambantota, Matale and Monaragala for those vegetables. Except for pumpkin, ladies' fingers and ash plantain, prices of all the other low country varieties had decreased by less than 24% due to high supplies.

As a result of delayed *Maha* season for pumpkin in Anuradhapura district, the newly established *Yala* cultivation had not reached the harvesting stage by July, which in turn reported a sharp drop in supplies to the wholesale market. Therefore, prices of pumpkin had increased by 60% in July. With the onset of peak *Yala* season for vegetable harvesting, prices are expected to be at a lower range for most of the varieties in the coming month.

Meanwhile, prices of green chilies had increased by 65%, due to delayed *Yala* harvesting season in Anuradhapura and Jaffna. On the contrary, prices of lime recorded a high margin drop of 46% due to reaching of harvesting season in Ampara and Monaragala.

In line with the wholesale prices, retail prices of most of the vegetables had also decreased in July. The highest price drop was reported for leeks as 30%. However, prices of most of the vegetables had increased compared to the same period of last year, in the retail market, with the highest value recorded for beetroot as 73%.

4. Fruits

Prices and Supply/Demand Situation

Wholesale prices of all the fruit varieties except passion fruit, imported grapes and mango variety Kohu had increased in July compared to the prices in June. Prices of all the banana varieties except Seeni had increased in the range of 1%-51% while, price of Seeni had not changed significantly. The price ranges recorded for Ambul, Kolikuttu and Seeni during the month were Rs.30.00-60.00/kg, Rs.100.00-130.00/kg and Rs.50.00-70.00/kg respectively. Prices of Anamalu and Ambun ranged between Rs.10.00-18.00/fruit and Rs.15.00-22.00/fruit respectively. Further, prices of small, medium and large sized pineapple had increased in the range of 46%-60% and the monthly average wholesale prices of small, medium and large sized fruits were Rs.114.87/fruit, Rs.153.07/fruit and Rs.195.29/fruit respectively and the price ranged between Rs.90.00-230.00/fruit. Prices of mango varieties, Karthakolomban, Betti and Vilad had increased by 88%, 70% and 69% respectively. Price range recorded for a Karthakolomban fruit was Rs.40.00-80.00. However, price of mango variety Kohu had decreased by 32%. Price of papaw had increased by 27% and the monthly average wholesale price was Rs.72.24/kg and the price ranged between Rs.50.00-120.00/kg. In addition, increased prices were observed for avocado, wood apple, slime apple and orange and prices had increased by 53%, 40%, 15% and 1% respectively.

At the same time, price decreases were noted for imported grapes and passion fruit and prices had decreased by 15% and 9% respectively.

According to the data in previous years, prices of fruit varieties, papaw, passion fruit, pineapple, mango, slime apple and all the banana varieties are expected to increase in the coming month while, prices of woodapple, orange and avocado are expected to decrease.

Compared to the same period of 2017, wholesale prices of most of the fruit varieties had decreased and the highest price decrease was noted for mango variety Karthakolomban as 47%.

In line with the increased wholesale prices, prices of all the fruit varieties except orange and imported grapes had increased at the retail level too. Prices of all the banana varieties had increased in the range of 1%-26%. The price ranges recorded for Ambul, Kolikuttu and Seeni were Rs.70.00-120.00/kg, Rs.140.00-200.00/kg and Rs.80.00-140.00/kg respectively. Prices of Anamalu and Ambun ranged between Rs.14.00-22.00/fruit and Rs.17.00-25.00/fruit respectively. Prices of small, medium and large sized pineapple had increased by 54%, 44% and 47% respectively and price ranged between Rs.100.00-300.00/fruit. Further, prices of mango varieties Karthakolomban and Vilad had increased by 65% and 40% respectively. Price of papaw had increased by 43% and the price ranged between Rs.80.00-200.00/kg. In addition, prices of wood apple, avocado, slime apple and passion fruit and had increased by 26%, 12%, 6% and 4% respectively.

However, as mentioned earlier, prices of imported grapes and orange had decreased by 4% and 2% respectively and prices were noted as Rs.700.00-900.00/kg and Rs.40.00-80.00/fruit respectively.

Compared to the same period of 2017, retail prices of all the fruit varieties except papaw, orange and imported grapes had decreased and the highest price decrease was noted for mango (Karthakolomban) as 40%.

With reference to the producer prices, producers had received increased prices for banana varieties, Ambul and Kolikuttu and for papaw compared to the prices in June, 2018. The prices had increased by 75% for Ambul, by 34% for Kolikuttu and by 33% for papaw. Further, producer prices for Ambul, Kolikuttu and papaw ranged between Rs.25.00-53.33/kg, Rs.56.67-90.00/kg and Rs.48.00 - 66.17/kg respectively. At the same time, compared to July, 2017, producer prices had decreased for Ambul by 33% and for Kolikuttu by 30% and it was a price increase for papaw by 27% (Table 4.3).

Exports/Imports of Fruits

According to the Sri Lanka Customs, Sri Lanka had exported 668mt of fresh fruits in July, 2018 to the value of Rs.93mn. Of the exported quantity, 85% were papaw, 8% were fresh pineapple, 6% were fresh mangoes and 1% was fresh avocados. In the month of June, 2018, the quantity exported was 628mt. Therefore, compared to last month, the exported quantity had increased by 6%.

With reference to imports, Sri Lanka had imported 2,739mt of fresh fruits during the month and the value was Rs.527mn. Of the imported quantity, 55% were apple, 24% were oranges and 21% were grapes. The main importing countries of apple were South Africa, the United States, China and New Zealand. South Africa, Australia and Egypt were the importing countries of oranges. Grapes had been imported from China, Italy and Egypt. In the month of June, 2018, the quantity imported was 2,880mt. Therefore, compared to last month, the imported quantity had decreased by 5%.

5. Fish, Dried Fish, Eggs and Meat

Fish

Prices and Supply/Demand Situation

Average wholesale prices of selected fresh fish ranged between Rs.217.00/kg and Rs.1274.00/kg during July. Weekly market observations indicated that the supply of fresh fish has decreased during this month due to monsoon winds that prevailed in the coastal regions. Low fresh fish supply was observed in markets in Rikillagaskada, Hambantota, Puttalam, Tissamaharama, Weeravila, and Keppetipola. Small fresh fish types such as Salaya and Hurulla were not sufficiently available in markets at Matale and Monaragala. Thus, prices of Salaya, Hurulla, Kelawalla, and Thora have increased compared to the previous month. The highest price increment was observed in Kelawalla as 6%, followed by Salaya as 4%. Prices of Hurulla and Thora have increased by 1%. Similarly, prices of most fresh fish types are expected to rise next month. In the meantime, prices of a few types fresh have decreased; the highest price decrement was observed in Balaya as 10%, followed by Shrimp (3%). Prices of Paraw and Thalapath have decreased by only 1%. Interestingly, price of Mora has not changed significantly over the month. Compared to the same period last year, wholesale prices of most fresh fish types have increased by 1%-70%, and the highest price increase was observed in Salaya. In addition, prices of Balaya, Hurulla, and Kelawalla have increased by

more than 20%. Interestingly, Shrimp did not show any significant change in price, whilst price of Thalapath has decreased only by 1%.

Average retail prices of selected fresh fish types ranged between Rs.289.00/kg and Rs.1679.00/kg during this month. Consumers had to pay between Rs.200.00 and Rs.2600.00 to purchase a kilo of any type of fresh fish. Retail prices of most fresh fish types showed increments between 1% and 4%. The highest price increment was observed in Paraw, followed by Kelawalla (3%), and Shrimp (2%). The least price increment of 1% was noted for Thalapath and Balaya. In the meantime, prices of Hurulla and Salaya have decreased slightly by 4% and 1%, respectively, despite their price increments shown in the wholesale prices. Moreover, price of Mora has decreased by 1%, whilst price of Thora has not changed significantly over the month. Compared to the same period of last year, retail prices of all fresh fish types have increased by 2%-46%, and the highest price increment was recorded for Salaya. Except Thora and Thalapath, which showed a price increment of 2%, all other fresh fish types showed price increments of 15% or above.

Prices and Supply/Demand Situation

Average wholesale prices of selected dried fish ranged between Rs.306.00/kg and Rs.1300.00/kg during July. Prices of most dried fish types have increased compared to the previous month. High prices of fresh fish might have led towards the low production of dried fish, especially, the local ones. The highest price increments were observed in local and imported Thora as 11% and 9%, respectively. Supply of Thora was very low in markets, especially, in Puttalam. Moreover, price of local Maduwa was reported as 8%. Interestingly, prices of a few dried fish types such as local and imported Sprats, imported Balaya and Maduwa have increased by 6%. Price of local Balaya has increased by 3%, followed by 2% in imported Anguluwa and 1% in both imported Kattawa and local Mora. In the meantime, prices of local Kattawa and Salaya have decreased by 6% and 3%, respectively. Moreover, prices of both imported Mora and local Anguluwa have decreased by 1%.

Compared to the same period of last year, wholesale prices of most dried fish types have increased. The highest price increment was noted as 20% in local Balaya, followed by local Thora (19%). Prices of imported Thora and local Salaya have increased by 16%, followed by 14% in local Kattawa and 13% in imported Balaya. Prices of local and imported Mora, imported Kattawa, and local Maduwa have increased by less than 10%. In the meantime, prices of local and imported Anguluwa and imported Maduwa have decreased by 7% or less, and that of imported and local Sprats have not changed significantly compared to the same period of last year.

Average retail prices of selected dried fish ranged between Rs.675.00/kg and Rs.1655.00/kg during this month. Consumers had to pay a price ranging between Rs.480.00 and Rs.2000.00 to purchase a kilo of any type of dried fish. In line with the increased wholesale prices, retail prices of all dried fish types except Kattawa and Mora have increased. For example, Maduwa showed the highest price increment as 9%, followed by 3% in imported and local Sprats, Thora, and Salaya. In addition, prices of both Balaya and Anguluwa have increased by 2%. Only Kattawa showed a price decrement of 1%, while price of Mora has not changed significantly over the month. Compared the same period of last year, prices of all dried fish types except imported Sprats have increased by 2%-15%. The highest price increment was observed in Salaya, Maduwa, and Thora. Prices of all other price increased dried fish types have increased by less than 10%. The only price decrement was observed as 6% for imported Sprats.

Eggs

Wholesale prices of brown and white eggs have increased by 12% and 13%, respectively, during July. Low supply of fish has increased the demand for eggs. Moreover, a vitamin deficiency that prevailed among birds have decreased the egg production, creating a low supply of eggs. Consequently, prices of eggs have increased. Price of a brown egg ranged between Rs.16.50 and Rs.18.50, whilst that of a white egg ranged between Rs.15.50 and Rs.17.50. Compared to the same period of last year, prices of brown and white eggs have increased by 23% and 29%, respectively.

Retail price of a brown egg ranged between Rs.17.00 and Rs.21.00, and that of a white egg ranged between Rs.16.00 and Rs.20.00 during this month. Average prices of brown and white eggs were recorded as Rs.18.71 and Rs.17.69, respectively. Compared to the previous month, prices of brown and white eggs have increased by 12% and 13%, respectively. Similarly, compared to the same period of last year, prices of brown and white eggs have increased by 24% and 28%, respectively.

Meat

Prices of most meat types have not changed significantly during July. For example, price changes of Beef, Broiler Chicken, and Mutton were insignificant. Price changes were only recorded for Curry Chicken and Pork. Price of Curry Chicken had increased by 8% mainly due to lower number of poultry birds slaughtered as they are used for more egg production since egg prices are high. The highest price for Curry Chicken was noted as Rs.800.00 per one kilo. Interestingly, Curry Chicken was not available in certain markets such as Matale and Mullaitivu. The only other price increased meat type was noted as Pork, and its price has increased by 5%. Compared to the same period of last year, prices of all types of meat have increased by 1%-25%, and the highest price increment was noted for Curry Chicken, followed by 8% in Mutton and 7% in Broiler Chicken.

6. Wheat grain, Wheat flour and Sugar

Wheat grain, Wheat flour

A total quantity of 115,494mt. worth of 4,953mn. wheat grain had been imported during the month of July. Compared to the previous month, quantity of this month has decreased by 6%. Wheat grain for the month of July had been mainly imported from the United States (42%) and the CIF price was Rs.43.00/kg. Second and third highest wheat grain quantities were imported from Canada (45,056mt.) and Pakistan (14,899mt.) respectively. In addition, wheat grain had been imported from Australia (6%). Few quantities were also imported from India as well. The CIF price of wheat grain ranged between Rs.36.00-52.00/kg and the average CIF price was recorded as Rs.42.00/kg. Compared to the previous month, average CIF price for wheat grain has increased by Rs.3.00/kg. The highest CIF price was reported for the Indian wheat grain stock whilst, the lowest recorded for Pakistan stocks.

A total quantity of 252mt. of wheat flour worth of 16mn. had been imported during the month of July. Compared to the previous month, quantity of this month has drastically decreased. The highest quantity of wheat flour for the month of July had been imported from Pakistan (38%) and the CIF price was Rs.49.00/kg. Further, wheat flour had been imported from India (19%), Indonesia (8%), Germany (2%) and Malaysia (2%) as well. In addition, few quantities were also imported from China. The CIF price for wheat flour for the month of July ranged between Rs.49.00-102.00/kg and the average CIF was Rs.65.00/kg. Compared to the previous month, average CIF price for wheat flour stock whilst, the lowest recorded for the Pakistan stocks.

Meanwhile, the local retail price of wheat flour ranged between Rs.89.00-90.00/kg and the average price was Rs.90.00/kg. The average retail price of wheat flour remained unchanged during the month. However, compared to the same period of last year, retail price of wheat flour has increased by less than 1%.

February

A total quantity of 42,781mt. worth of 2,515mn. of sugar had been imported to the country during the month of July. Compared to the previous month, quantity of this month has increased by 6%. Sugar for the month of July had been mainly imported from India (84%) and CIF price was Rs.57.00/kg. The second highest sugar quantity was imported from Thailand (13%). Furthermore, sugar had been also imported from Korea (1%), United Arab Emirates (1%) and Pakistan (1%). In addition, few quantities were also imported from Singapore and the United Kingdom. The CIF prices ranged between Rs.56.00-90.00/kg and the average CIF price was reported as Rs.59.00/kg. The average CIF price has increased by Rs.3.00/kg compared to previous month. The highest CIF price was applied to the imports of Korea, while the lowest for the Pakistan stocks.

Referring to the local retail price of sugar for the month of July, the average retail price was Rs.105.00/kg. Average retail price for sugar remained unchanged. However, compared to the same period of last year average retail price of sugar has decreased by 1%.
